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Introduction

- Aims.
- The aim of these series of short slide shows is to give you an introduction to sedative and analgesic drugs used in the critical care unit.
- We also want to suggest how these drugs should be used and what we are trying to achieve and avoid when using them.
- As well as this we want to give you some tools to help you to measure how well the drugs are working and if your patient is suffering from pain, delirium or anxiety.
- Finally we want to suggest non-drug ways of helping patients stay calm and free from pain.

What are we trying to achieve?

- There are a small number of patients who need to be deeply sedated and sometimes even given muscle relaxant drugs.
- Most patients we aim to have awake, calm and free from pain.
- Deep sedation has lots of side effects and so we only use it when really needed.
- Having more patients awake, calm and free from pain depends on the knowledge and skills of all critical care staff.
